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Cane Quest - We Cane, We Conquered

OSB's 7th annual Cane Quest was held on Thursday, Nov. 15th.

Cane Quest is a competition where students practice their orientation and mobility skills that they learned from their awesome O&M instructors.

Tasks vary from group to group, based on grade level:

- ◆ **Scouts** are the group of students in **grades 3-6**. They completed tasks on campus including navigating stairs and doors, locating dropped objects, and upper and lower protective technique.
- ◆ **Explorers** are students in **grades 7-9**. They competed off campus, completing a route downtown. They demonstrated skills such as crossing streets and business driveways, advocating for assistance, several cane techniques, and proper human guide techniques.
- ◆ **Trailblazers** are in **grades 10-12**, and they completed the same tasks as the Explorers.

Phrase of the Month for January is "Think Win Win"

Win-win requires that you be both. It is a balancing act between courage and consideration.

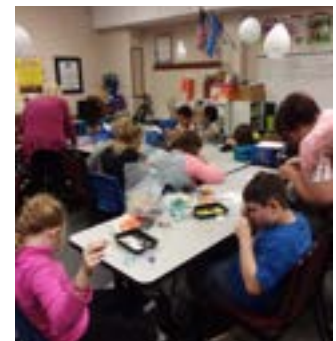
Elementary Braille Club

You hear it all the time: "Don't trust the government." We ask ourselves what exactly goes on in this entity that has so much control over our lives.

On the week of November 4,

National Close Up 2018.

The program invites select students from around the U.S. and beyond to explore the nation's capitol and absorb all it has to offer.

They visited sites including memorials of WWII, Abraham Lincoln, Martin Luther King, Jr., and the Korean and Vietnam Wars.

Each group of students was led by a program instructor (PI) who explained the history behind them, then challenged their groups with questions about the monuments'

symbolism and how their meanings apply to society today.

They had the opportunity to watch live liberal/conservative debates with questions and topics chosen by them.

On Wednesday of that week, they went to Capitol Hill to meet with state Congressmen and take a tour of the capitol.

After a long day of discussion (and lots of walking), the students got to unwind and watch a stunning live performance of the musical 'Anything Goes'.

Another notable activity of the week was "Mock Congress", a simulation of the congressional process of passing bills that called for EVERY student to get involved in the debate. A central theme of the week was to increase political efficacy, or the belief that you can influence public policy.

Mock Congress, the workshops the PIs led, and exposure to new opinions all accounted for the spike in confidence in so many students by the end of the week.

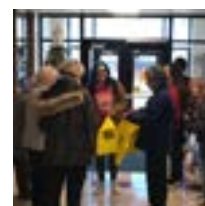

Good Vibes with the iPhone Gesture Update

We all know that Apple has recently released some new technology; if you didn't know, well you know now.

One of the new pieces of technology is the **iPhone XR**.



The new iPhone does not have a home button. So I bet you are wondering "How do we use Voice Over and Siri?" Well, it's actually not that complicated. The side lock-button is now acting as the home-button.

To activate Siri, you now press and hold the lock-button. Easy!

To activate Voice Over, you can go into your accessibility shortcuts and setup the shortcut to triple click the side lock-button to activate Voice Over or you can just ask Siri to activate it.

To close apps, slide your finger from the very bottom edge of your phone, up the screen, until you feel a vibration.

To activate the app switcher, slide your finger from the bottom edge of the phone, upward until you feel a second vibration.

To activate the control center, slide your finger from the top of the phone, downward until you feel the first vibration and **to activate the notification center**, slide your finger from the top of the phone downward until you feel the second vibration.

I hope these tips dispel your doubts about accessibility with the new iPhones.

Just feel the good vibrations.

7 Nov 2018 - Bowling at Green Country Lanes for 8th grade and Up



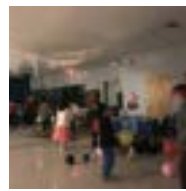
Fried food and bowling. The greatest escape known, since, well ever!!!! A magic bus ride later,

for their tree, or gifts to family, friends, or teachers alike. The snowflakes come in light blue, dark blue, and pale green

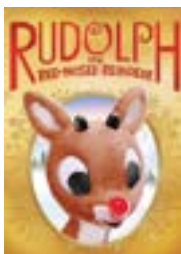
designs with a white background. Sporting rhinestones to be glued on, these snowflakes were unique just like the real snowflakes of the season.

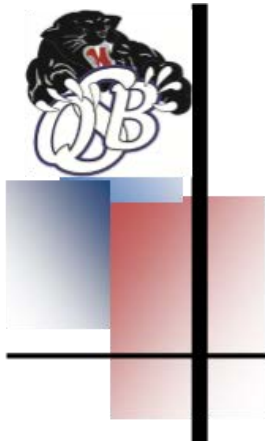
