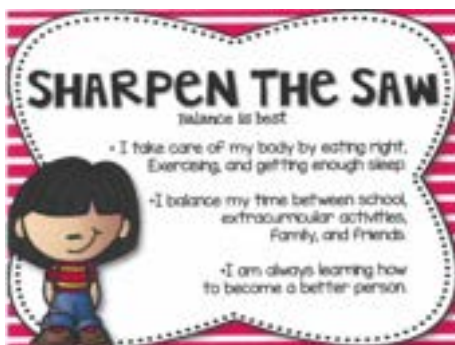

It means regularly renewing and strengthening the four key dimensions of life – body, brain, heart, and soul.

Seek continuous improvement and renewal professionally and personally.

Sharpen the Saw means preserving and enhancing the

greatest asset you have – **you**. It means having a balanced program for self-renewal in the four areas of your life: physical, social/emotional, mental, and spiritual.

Here are some examples of activities:

Physical:

Beneficial eating, exercising, and resting

Social/Emotional:

Making social and meaningful connections with others

Mental:

Learning, reading, writing, and teaching

Spiritual:

Spending time in nature, expanding spiritual self through meditation, music, art, or service

As you renew yourself in each of the four areas, you create growth and change in your life. Sharpen the Saw keeps you fresh so you can continue to practice the other six habits. You increase your capacity to produce and handle the challenges around you.

Without this renewal, the body becomes weak, the mind mechanical, the emotions raw, the spirit insensitive, and the person selfish. Not a pretty picture, is it?

You can pamper yourself mentally and spiritually. Or you can go through life oblivious to your well-being. You can experience vibrant energy. Or you can procrastinate and miss out on the benefits of good health and exercise. You can revitalize yourself and face a new day in peace and harmony. Or you can wake up in the morning full of apathy because your get-up-and-go has got-up-and-gone.

Just remember that every day provides a new opportunity for renewal – a new opportunity to recharge yourself instead of hitting the wall. All it takes is the desire, knowledge, and skill.

Elementary Field Trip to Honor Heights Park

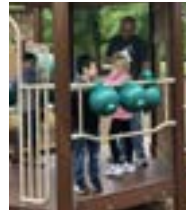

spend most of the day outside enjoying three different inflatables.

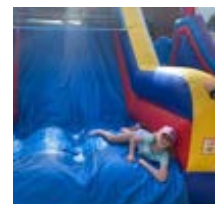
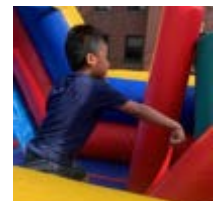
The weather cooperated nicely, although it was a bit warm.

Microcredits/-loans - 6th Grade Geography lesson

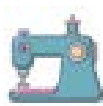

The 6th Grade Western Geography class was recently studying about Central America and the Caribbean Islands.

Our textbook was sharing illustrations of how a Microcredit (or Microloan) many times changes a large number of people's lives in these areas.

Microcredit is a small loan, often times less than \$200 dollars - many times about \$85 dollars. The Borrowers in Central America and the Caribbean invest this loan in various kinds of business ventures, such as a sewing machine, which enables them to start making clothes in order to sell, or maybe poultry in order to sell the eggs, just to name a few.



Our textbook brought out that there is a **97 percent success rate** in the repayment of these Microcredit loans as well, which are paid back in small increments.

So often it changes impoverished people's lives in these areas, as it gives them a means to make an income and support themselves. This principle is also applied in other parts of the world like Africa or India.

So, in our 6th Grade class we learned about profit/lost and what an investment was and how it often takes money (an Initial Investment) in order to make money.



I challenged the students to take a Microloan of \$5 dollars from me and to try to invest it into a business venture of some sort in order to make a profit.

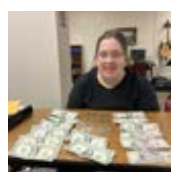


I had all 6 of my students take me up on that challenge.

First, I had them gather ideas from family, other teachers, staff, adults, and friends, possible ways in which the student might invest the microloan of \$5 dollars in order to gain a profit and then they could choose from the list of ideas.

Noah D. and Stephanie S. went into business together, combining their loans of \$5 dollars each and purchased a box of Graham crackers, a bag of fun size Hershey Chocolate Bars and a bag of Large Marshmallows. They washed their hands thoroughly and then sanitized and formed an assembly line making up individual S'mores Singles Kits, ready to purchase in an individual Ziploc bags.

"The S'mores kiddo's" sold their "S'mores Singles" like hot cakes making **\$36.50** after paying me back their Microloan of \$5 each.



Stephanie made a profit of **\$31.50** &



Noah made a profit of **\$5**.

Next, Payton C. and Macey M. took my Microloan of \$5 each and went into business together to purchase a Box of Blow pop Suckers which they then sold for "3 for a dollar" making **\$22.25** combined.



Payton made **\$14.25** & Macey made **\$8**



dollars profit after repaying their initial Microloan of \$5 dollars each.

Last but not least, Lilly M. and Blake P. joined together to purchase a box of Airheads with their Microloan and sold Airheads "2 for a dollar." After paying back their Microloan of \$5 dollars they made a profit of **\$17 dollars**.



Lilly made **\$14** & Blake made **\$3** dollars.



WOWZA WEEZA !

At the end of our experiment, each student that participated voluntarily donated a small portion of their profits along with my donation to Samaritan's Purse, which is a Christian Organization that is currently giving needed Aid to the Ukrainian People who are displaced because of the Russian/Ukrainian War.

I am SO **EXTREMELY PROUD** of these 6th Graders and their business ventures.

Some of the lessons the students experienced were...

1. Basic Math Skills

4. Economics terms like Assets/Liabilities

- ◆ **Noah said:** "I learned that making money is harder than it looks. Another thing is to keep up with your money or it can get stolen. I really liked doing this project and I hope my money is helpful to the Ukrainian Refugees."
- ◆ **Lilly said:** "I have learned how to be responsible, to take care of my money and keep up with my product and giving to those in need is good!"
- ◆ **Blake said:** "I learned to be responsible with handling money. I learned how to sell. I learned it takes patience and it feels great to give to the less fortunate."
- ◆ **Payton said:** "I learned it takes a little nerve because I was a little bit nervous at first and it also takes patience because I have none. It takes confidence in myself. The sixth grade class is donating to those in need so I'm

happy about all this. Thank you Mr. Butler for making me go out of my comfort zone."

- ◆ **Macey said:** "Well, it may have been only one day, but a fun day that was. I sold blow pops 3 for \$1 dollar. We were hall walking that day which made my job ten times easier. I could stop kids in the middle of the hall, acting like one of those annoying salesmen. I'm honestly very grateful I got to learn about Microloans and how they've changed people's lives. I even enjoyed learning about owning my own business."

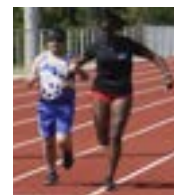
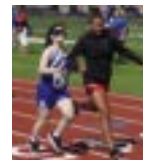
William Winston and **Piper Conner** both placed second in shot put.

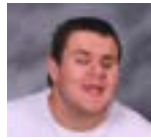

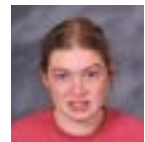

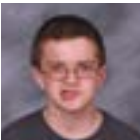

This year the 11th and 12th graders traveled to Oklahoma City and partied like rock stars.

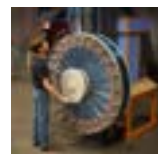
Thursday night a heated game of **Family Feud** "Juniors versus Seniors" kept them entertained.

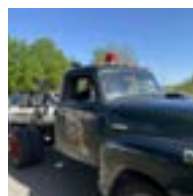


The Jr/Sr class had a fantastic "Night Under the Stars".
