The sponsors also made sure we had plenty of prizes and the beautiful medals for the contestants who placed. This was the largest group of contestants ( 38 registered and 33 competed) we have ever had and the 10 testing rooms we used this year beat our previous record of 7 rooms. The score room was also full of new people. OSB graduates and former contestants worked on the other side of Braille Challenge scoring spelling, speed and accuracy, reading comprehension, proofreading, and charts and graphs tests.
Susana Jackman joined the local news teams of PBS, ABC, and CBS taking video and interviewing contestants and people in the score room. It was a beautiful sunny day, so contestants relaxed in the sunshine while the score room rounded up papers and tallied scores. Congratulations to

## OSB Spelling Bee

On Tuesday, February 6, 2024 the students at OSB got to compete in the OSB annual Spelling Bee, a competition where children try to spell words correctly and, if they make mistakes, they're out until one person is left. This has been at least the $33^{\text {rd }}$ event for OSB.

History states that the earliest known print evidence of the phrase "spelling bee" dates back to 1850, however around 1808 it was referred to as a "spelling match".

This year there were 15 contestants from $3^{\text {rd }}-8^{\text {th }}$ grade.
Each student was given a graded list of words with difficulty ranging from $1^{\text {st }}-8^{\text {th }}$ grade to study in preparation for the Spelling Bee.

On the day of the competition the students went up on stage and took their seats, as practiced the previous day. Then, one by one, came up to the microphone and introduced themselves by name, age, and grade. After that, the bee begun. The host would say the word, then the contestants would follow a procedure when spelling: say the word, spell the word, then say the word again.

Before spelling they could ask a few questions: "can you repeat the
word, can you put the word in a sentence, or can I get the definition?"

After the spelling bee ended each contestant received a certificate of participation. The $1^{\text {st }}, 2^{\text {nd }}$, and $3^{\text {rd }}$ place winners received a medal.

The $1^{\text {st }}$ place winner was Kesslee Travis, who won, spelling the word "enchantment". The $2^{\text {nd }}$ place went to Blake Priddy who got out on the word "collision" and $3^{\text {rd }}$ place went to Kennedy Sullivan who got out on the word "calculus".

The $1^{\text {st }}$ and $2^{\text {nd }}$ place winners will advance to the Eastern Oklahoma State Spelling Bee held at the Muskogee Civic Center on Friday, April $26^{\text {th }}$ at 6:30 p.m.

After the spelling bee I (Piper C.) interviewed the top 3 contestants.

Kennedy Sullivan said that this was her $3^{\text {rd }}$ year competing and that she enjoyed the spelling bee. I asked what her favorite part was and how she felt afterwards, in response she said, "My favorite part was the spelling. I felt confused that I won because I spelt the word wrong and thought I lost, but I was happy that I won."

Blake Priddy has been competing in the spelling bee for the past 5 years. He competes in the spelling bee for the thrill of com-
petition. Blake was disappointed that he got $2^{\text {nd }}$ but is excited that he gets to go to Regionals. Blake would like to thank Coach Gamble for helping him learn his spelling words.
This was the $5^{\text {th }}$ year that Kesslee Travis has participated in the spelling bee. She said that her favorite part was "when I spell and win, and also the Regionals." She said she felt nervous about going to Regionals. I asked her how she felt after she won and she said, "tears of joy and excitement." She said that she was also surprised and didn't even expect it. Then I asked her if she had anything else she would like to add and she said, "I like that the Regionals have a reception where we get to go and eat cake."

We'd like to congratulate all of the participants who competed in OSB's spelling bee; and wish Kesslee Travis and Blake Priddy good luck at Regionals in April.

Mississippi Civil Rights Museum, Jackson, MS https://2mm.mdah.ms.gov/

The Mississippi Civil Rights Museum's eight galleries chronicle the events of the national Civil Rights Movement that took place in Mississippi.

In the first and second galleries, a timeline illustrates the history of Africans in Mississippi, slavery, and the origins of the Jim Crow era. Monuments memorialize people who were victims of lynching in the state. The heart of the museum is the third gallery - a central space lit by a dramatic light sculpture that plays the museum's theme song, "This Little Light of Mine" - highlighting people who laid down their lives for the Movement. The next four galleries focus on the years 1945-1975. Visitors will see the mug shots of every Freedom Rider arrested in Mississippi and hear the stories of civil rights veterans such as Fannie Lou Hamer, Vernon Dahmer, and Medgar Evers. The eighth and final gallery - Where Do We Go From Here? - challenges visitors to consider their own communities as they reflect on their experience at the museum and observe how the Civil Rights Movement in Mississippi has served as an example for movements all over the world.
