The highlight of the day, besides watching their friend and peer receive her award, was being introduced from the Senate floor and listening to the senators work.



Her twin brother, Nathan, and younger sister Leah, also volunteered. During that time, Natalie not only learned about orientation and mobility skills but also worked with different students at different levels who inspired her.

You contestants must have made an impact on her because she spent both time and energy writing this grant to bring extra Love to all the contestants in Cane Quest!

Let's Choose Love is an organization that provides mini grants, up to \$1000, mostly to people ages 16 to 30, to do something good in their community. The movement is dedicated to bringing forth a world where Love Rules! (https://www.letschooselove.org/)

Natalie's application may have

stood out in particular because the director of the organization said her sister was blind, so this project meant a lot to her. Natalie didn't know about that when she applied.

Natalie is currently a student at Northeastern State University. She is studying to become a bilingual (Spanish/English) speech and language pathologist. She said that she has been inspired by volunteering at OSB and feels like working with children is her career path.





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Muskogee Street Improvement Advisory Committee Meeting

Jaylee Burnside, Stephanie Story, and Rosie Coomer presented their experiences as travelers with visual impairments at the monthly Muskogee Street Improvement Advisory Committee meeting.

Their presentation was part of the Action In Muskogee (AIM) committee report that works to improve sidewalks, transit, trails, and bikeways in Muskogee to promote a healthy lifestyle and access to community resources.

Faye Miller has been an AIM committee member for many years and worked closely with Doug Walton, committee chair, to help Jaylee, Stephanie and Rosie prepare their presentation.

Jaylee and Stephanie talked about how they use their white canes to find drop-offs and obstacles and why it is important, especially at street crossings, to use their canes so they are identified as visually impaired and White Cane laws will protect them.

They also talked about how they use traffic cues to know when it is safe to cross the street and how the audible countdown found at certain crossings makes it hard to pay attention to the traffic.

Ms. Rosie discussed her experiences when she was younger and rode bikes with her around Muskogee. She wants to have those same experiences with her twins and talked about the types improvements that would help them bike around town safely and freely. She also talked about how her vision affects how she sees in different lighting situations. This helped the Advisory committee understand importance of having accessible crossings and how it helps everyone who uses the crossing, not just those with visual impairments.

After the presentation, the committee members asked specific questions about the sidewalk on Gibson St. and the

traffic lights at the corner of York St. and Gibson St. They are interested in making improvements that will make travel easier, especially for our high school students who have earned independent travel privileges and want to walk down the street to the local shops after school.

Jaylee, Stephanie and Ms. Rosie advocated for improvements in accessibility for pedestrians in Muskogee. This not only helps you, the students at OSB, but EVERYONE who lives and works in Muskogee. Thank you for sharing your experiences and advocating for improvements!



Speed Radar - Update / Follow Up Data

Elbin Carrillo, Julio Valdez, Erikson Lopez, Chris Sumner, Adan Duran, and Jerry Rodriguez worked with the Action in Muskogee/Connect Muskogee team again in March to collect additional speed data in front of OSB on Gibson St.



This data is being collected all over Muskogee County at different school locations as part of a **Safe Routes to School program**. We hope this data will better inform our local government and help make school zones safer places for students.

During the school day, there are flashing School Zone lights at each end of Gibson St. by our school that limit the speed of vehicles to 25 mph.

The day we recorded data was cold but sunny. Surprisingly, the speed data compared to the collection in February showed some different trends.

Average speeds for vehicles coming from West of OSB were down from 23 mph in February to about 21 mph in March. To the East of OSB, the average speed also went down from an

average of 28 mph to 26 mph.

Who would have thought that vehicles would travel slower on a sunny day than in wet and rainy conditions?

There were still many vehicles

traveling above the speed limit, between 35-39 mph through the flashing School Zone area. The highest speed recorded was 39 mph, with several vehicles traveling 36 mph. This is also down from the highest speed recorded in February of 56 mph!

Before we headed back to school, we took a stroll through the arboretum.





After some good food and time to chill we headed to "Ripley's Believe It Or Not"


Museum where

They were lined up at the starting line and waited for the signal to GO!




Students scampered field across the turning over leaves and grass to find the hidden eggs.
