Tera Webb selected for CDC program for Educators

Oklahoma School for the Blind Physical Education Teacher, Tera Webb, was selected for a new CDC program.

Project **SWITCH** has selected Oklahoma School for the Blind Public Schools' Physical Education Teacher, Tera Webb. She was selected to be one of sixteen physical educators in the state to participate in a CDC leadership program designed to assist schools in adjusting to the challenges of COVID-19.

According to Shana Classen, Director of Health and Physical Education, Oklahoma State Dept. of Education, Project **SWITCH** (*Strengthening Wellness and Improving Teachers and Children's Health*) is a one-year

supplemental program from the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) with the goal of providing training and assistance to schools on the implementation of the CDC's COVID-19 school-based guidance in the areas of physical activity, chronic disease management, social emotional climate, nutrition services, and supporting high risk/vulnerable populations.

As part of the project, Mrs. Webb will attend monthly meetings and receive additional trainings. A region of the state will be assigned to each member of Project SWITCH, and physical educators like Mrs. Webb will conduct virtual Communities of Practice meetings to

disseminate CDC information and provide professional support to individuals at other schools in the region.

Word of the Month - Encouragement



Encouragement

- the action of giving someone support, confidence, or hope.

Encouragement

builds up hope and hope creates a community.


Here are some sections of an article by **Dr. Jane Nelsen**

Rudolf Dreikurs taught, "A child needs encouragement like a plant needs water." In other words, encouragement is essential. Children may not die without encouragement, but they certainly wither... Since encouragement is so essential, it's helpful for parents and teachers to know exactly what encouragement means and how to use it. Let's start with what encouragement is

not.

Encouragement is Not Praise

Praise is not encouraging because it teaches children to become "approval junkies." They learn to depend on others to evaluate their worth. Research by [Carol Dweck, Ph.D.](#) a professor at Stanford University, has now proven what Adler taught years ago. Too much praise is not good for children. Dweck found that praise can hamper risk taking. Children who were praised for being smart when they accomplished a task chose easier tasks in the future. They didn't want to risk making mistakes.



On the other hand, children who were "encouraged" for

their efforts were willing to choose more challenging tasks when given a choice. As Dreikurs said, "Encourage the deed [or effort], not the doer." In other words, instead of, "You got an A, I'm so proud of you," try, "This report card shows how hard you worked. You must be learning a lot!"

Encouragement Is

Encouragement is helping your children develop courage - courage to grow and develop into the people they want to be. Courage to feel capable, to be resilient, to enjoy life, to be happy, contributing members of society, and, as Dreikurs said, "To have the courage to be imperfect," to feel free to make

mistakes and to learn from them.

So, now I must go back to what encouragement is not.

Encouragement is not rescuing, fixing, over-protecting

What would happen if the mother bird felt guilty about pushing her baby bird out of the nest so it will learn to fly? The baby bird would not survive. How well do our children survive when they don't develop their disappointment muscles, their resiliency muscles, their delayed gratification muscles, and their courage to be imperfect muscles? When parents rescue, fix, and overprotect, they rob their children of the opportunity to learn that they can survive disappointment; that they can survive the ups and downs of life and learn many life skills in the

process.

How to Encourage

Positive Discipline tools such as the following are designed to be encouraging to children:

- ◆ [Family Meetings](#) and [Class Meetings](#) where children learn to give and receive compliments and learn to brainstorm for solutions to problems.
- ◆ [Curiosity Questions](#) to invite children how to think instead of what to think - and to give them a sense of choice to use their personal power for social responsibility.
- ◆ [Letting Go](#) so children have opportunities to learn and grow - mistakes and all.
- ◆ [Show Faith](#) in children so they



can develop faith in themselves.

- ◆ Spending [Special Time](#) to make sure the message of love gets through.

There are many more - all designed to be empowering instead of enabling. A new Positive Discipline tool is called Energetic Encouragement.

Hager found his way to the library from the smell of all the tasty books. To him a book



OSB receives Mini Grants

Five mini grants were awarded by the **Oklahoma Foundation for the Education of Blind Children and Youth**.

The Foundation established the mini grant program in 1997 and since that time has awarded over \$50,000 in 60 mini grants to enhance educational opportunities for students with visual impairments across Oklahoma.

Mini grants are awarded to teachers with consideration to educational needs and benefits to the students and hopes they provide resources which will assist these students with visual impairments gain greater access to their educational curriculum.

Teachers evaluate their students' needs and determine the most appropriate specialized materials to help meet their needs.

This year, over \$3000 was distributed in 5 mini grants.

Three teachers at the Oklahoma School for the Blind received \$2000 in grants to purchase curriculum and other special materials for their classrooms.

Cassie Shelton, literacy coach at OSB, is excited to use her grant money to get new reading resources from a phonemic awareness curriculum. She will be able to purchase skill-based lessons to build reading skills. The lessons come with videos that will be great during times of distance learning and manipulative materials.

Kim Thomas, special education teacher of the visually impaired at OSB, will use her grant money to purchase tactile materials for her multiple-disability students to help her students learn to follow specific steps (sequencing), reinforce reading and math skills, and reinforce pre-braille skills.

Christy Hargrove, braille teacher at OSB, is purchasing a braille curriculum that includes high interest reading materials for upper elementary to high school learners. She is excited that she will be able to individualize lessons with the digital files that are included.


Elementary's "Virtual Field Trip to New York City"

Contestants completed these rubrics 1-on-1 with a Certified Orientation and Mobility Specialist either in-person or virtually.

The rubrics required they demonstrate cane techniques like constant contact, 2-point touch and touch-and-drag, show that they understand how to use lateral and cardinal directions to locate a target, demonstrate a variety of human guide techniques, and showed they can locate head-level obstacles with an upper body technique.
