September's "Word of the Month" was **Encouragement**, which is defined as "the action of giving someone support, confidence, or hope."

Students have been reminded of this word and of its meaning regularly during classes and during the daily announcements.

In keeping with this idea, Mrs. Sterling, head of our department, wishes to continue the "Caught Being Good" campaign. She does this by calling attention to simple actions

students do to make things easier for others.

In addition, we are going to be using our Character Building lessons to help students examine family issues, and other social problems we all must learn to deal with in life.

The first theme is "things are changing at our house." During this unit, we want to focus on the arrival of a new baby, the divorce or separation of parents, and the loss of a pet.

Our librarian has helped me to choose some wonderful new books which point out that all life's experiences contain both bitter and sweet parts, and that we can learn how to face and understand them all.

Our goal is to help children understand that while some family issues can be difficult to live with, by working together, families can develop good ways to make these changes contain some positive experiences, and help to make these changes easier to accept.

October's "Word of the Month" is **Tolerance**, which is defined as "Willingness to accept feelings, habits, or beliefs that are different from your own."

As every month, students will be reminded of the "Word of the Month" and its meaning, during the daily announcements, and in class.

FCCLA Leadership Conference

On Wednesday, September 21, 2016, the leadership team - Richelle Zampella, Tai Thomas, Nicholas Jackson-Morrison, and myself - traveled to McAlester for a FCCLA leadership conference.

Over three hundred and fifty students from across the state came to participate in the event.

All students were divided into groups and spent some time getting to know each other in different workshops. All of us agreed that we were out of our comfort zone, but it was one of the best experiences we've ever had.

Tai Thomas said, "I had a nice time at the FCCLA conference, the ice breakers were a little nerve racking, but I needed it."

The keynote speaker, who was a former FCCLA member and district officer, offered encouraging words and used a lot of metaphors for explaining what life can be like, what it takes to be a good leader, and how to be successful. The speaker brightened my day and encouraged me to never stop trying to be my best, no matter how hard things may get.

I attended the workshop R&R (Recruit & Reward), which gave examples on how to get members to join FCCLA. It was a great experience because I got to meet so many new people and learned what it's like to be on my own, and not knowing everyone.

Richelle and I attended RATS St. Neve (STAR Events spelled backwards), which provided guidelines for competing in STAR events and stressed how important it is to always be prepared when having to do a presentation regardless of what it may be. The workshop hosts also stressed the importance of making eye contact, not fidgeting, standing up straight, and speaking

clearly enough so your audience can understand what you're saying.

"I have competed in STAR Events for the past two years, and this workshop got me excited for this year's competition," said Richelle.

Nicholas Jackson-Morrison liked being off campus, and the day was more than what he expected. The ice breakers allowed him to meet and greet new people. "We played games and interacted with other FCCLA members."

We all agreed that we had a good time and would like to go again next year!

Are you using your cane skills? Are you practicing orientation using north, south, east and west? How are your human guide skills?

Hopefully you are getting ready for our annual Oklahoma Cane Quest competition. Put Thursday, December 1st on your calendars. Permission forms are on the

way from the Braille Institute and will be due Thursday, November 3rd.

A student's visual acuity must fall within the **B1 through B2 classification range** as defined by the United States Association of Blind Athletes.

Class B1 - No light perception in either eye up to light perception, but inability to recognize the shape of a hand at any distance or in any direction.

Class B2 - From ability to recognize the shape of a hand up to visual acuity of 20/600 and/or a visual field of less than 5 degrees

in the best eye with the best practical eye correction.

Students who do not qualify with these vision requirements may choose to complete the route under blindfold and will qualify as Class B2.


