

Where There's a Wheel, There's a Way!

Orientation & Mobility (O&M) is one of the most important skills OSB teaches their students.

The wonderful O&M instructors spend countless lessons with the students, teaching them to cross streets and various other skills to ensure their students' independence. One of the skills taught to high school seniors is public transportation.

During the month of April, Faye Miller and Gina Woods took high school seniors out to Tulsa at the Midtown Memorial bus station to give them the chance to experience public transportation firsthand.



Students were divided into groups according to level of useful vision. Some took a bus route to Promenade Mall and others to Woodland Hills Mall.

Upon arriving at the bus station, students were required to purchase their own bus tickets and gather the information about the bus they were to take and had to advocate for assistance. They were responsible for remembering the times of arrival and departure of the bus they were to ride. Communicating with the bus driver to know where and when to meet their departing bus was also expected of the students (unless they wanted to find their way back to school).

Once at the mall, they had time to have lunch and shop before catching their bus back to the station.

It was up to the students to advocate and ask for directions to the stores they wanted to shop at and to the food court.

The O&M instructors intervened as little as possible; the point of bus travel is to encourage students to rely on themselves.

Using public transportation is a very important skill to learn if you are blind or visually impaired because obviously you wouldn't want these students driving.

The O&M instructors do a very good job of making bus travel fun for the students who are old enough to participate by letting them go to the mall, where they can do a little shopping and getting comfortable with advocating.

Bus travel is a great learning experience.
